However; if you have been considering additional projects to step it up a notch we can help!



Local Reliable Funding

Did you know that a potion of the SWCD's annual budget comes from Isanti County? It's true; each year the SWCD submits a request to the County to fund a portion of our budget. Our goal is to create reliable funding consisting of a 50-50 split of State and local funds. We are getting close to our goal! Over the last six years, the County has consistently increased the SWCD allocation because of our excellent work and relationships.



In the absence of other reliable funding mechanisms,

the County allocation supports staffing and operational expenses needed to implement local, voluntary natural resource conservation programs. These programs are based on demand from residents of the County and the State of Minnesota.

Over the last six years we have used this money in combination with State money to:

- 1. Hire a full-time staff person who focuses on agricultural conservation, land preservation and water monitoring.
- 2. Hire a half time staff person to assist the District Manager with administrative duties. This allows the District Manager to use her expertise in other areas such as watershed planning.
- 3. Leverage additional State funding to provide financial assistance to County residents to install natural resource conservation projects- over \$1.5 million to date!

As you can see, the money provides a strong return to taxpayers via additional grants that we leverage with the money, technical assistance with a smile, and protected resources (Quality of Life).

Conservation Workshops

The community plays a large role in protecting lakes and streams for future generations. Knowing what to do is the first step; that's where we come in!

The SWCD coordinates and hosts workshops to help you understand what you can do! Here's an example of what we have done in the past:

In 2019 the SWCD partnered with the Green



Lake Improvement District (GLID) to host a hands-on workshop to teach lakeshore owners how to protect their shoreline from erosion. Participants learned how to plant deep rooted native plants (these are the ones that prevent erosion and provide habitat) and to construct and install willow bundles to protect the lakeshore from erosion. Together, the community members installed a lakeshore restoration project. Participants learned that, in most cases, it doesn't take a special certification to restore their shore—anyone can do it!

Dan Howard, GLID member and Green Lake property owner said, "it was fantastic to see the Green Lake community working together with a common goal. They were excited to learn and participate. It just shows how much people care about keeping the lakes healthy!"

New Grant Program Focused at Green Lake

Green Lake has been accepted into a 16-year granting program by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The program has a goal of removing Green Lake from the State's Impaired Waters list.



So what does this mean? Over the next 10-16 years the SWCD will put extra effort into improving the health of

Green Lake, one of Isanti County's move valuable recreational lakes. The first phase of the grant includes \$284,000 to do projects that will have a direct impact on the lake. The grant requires a 40% match (\$185,926); the match will come from the Green Lake Improvement District, SWCD State funding, private funding, and landowners.

The program will focus on funding projects in the land area draining to North Brook and Wyanett Creek and the land adjacent to the lake itself. The projects will include things like wetland restorations, cover crops, buffers, raingardens and lakeshore restorations.
